The Month of MAY at Winter Nights

Greeting to all,

There are less than 10 days before the end of the 18th Family Shelter season of Winter Nights (June 6th) and we are still assisting families with shelter needs. In May we welcomed into our community 3 families – a Mom with a 7-months old daughter, a mom and 11-year daughter and a mom with 2 boys: 5 and 11 yrs. old. We are proud to offer them a safe place to be and to begin the process to find them a stable home.

In such an uncommon year, the support of the Winter Nights staff for our families has been tremendous, and they continue to offer support and

resources as the season comes to a close. They are remaining steadfast in finding and securing long term shelter or housing for all our families.

In the last issue of the Good News letter, we open our hearts and wished a speedy recovery to Donna, our Safe Parking Manager, who was hospitalized with an ongoing medical issue. She is out of the hospital, recovering, and has to move to Texas to be with her children. Donna took a small Safe Parking Program and grew it beyond expectations to a year-round program. Her compassion and commitment in helping people who needed a caring and loving friend is unsurpassed. This is Donna, she will be missed deeply, and I wish her the best in her ongoing recovery and in sharing her heart with others. See her note to us all below in the SPP section of this newsletter.

Be assured, the Safe Parking Program continues to thrive, and will operate year-round. The current SPP staff, Heather, Denice, and Ginger, have stepped in and are assisting the clients with case management, resources, and compassion. One young man has moved to a program that offered him housing. One more participant has joined the SPP family. The SPP is currently supporting 16 participants and 13 cars.

Continued Success does what it does best: assist alumni families when things get tough. We were able to financially assist one family this month with rent and utilities.

If you would like to help the SPP: As we near the hot summer months we are looking for support of extra bottled water and cooling towels or gel filled neck bandanas to keep them cool during the warm days and nights that are coming.

Judith also asked us to pass along her gratitude that their social hall, kitchen and bathrooms were left in "pristine condition" when families moved on to the next site.


End-of-Season Placements

The Family Shelter operates for 36 weeks, which means there is an "end-of-season". June 6th is the end of the 18th Season of Winter Nights Family Shelter. It will reopen in October 2022.

Families who are at the Shelter in these last few days are working with staff to find homes or shelter that will continue to support their journey to sustainable housing. Continued Success will stay in touch to follow-up. Safe Parking will continue year-round.

A Personal Note from Donna

In the last Good News letter we asked for your prayers for Donna Zukauckas, Safe Parking manager, who was hospitalized. She is out of the hospital and sent this note to everyone.

Greetings to Everyone,

As you may or may not know I was hospitalized at the end of April and intubated for 12 days to keep me "alive" until my kids could all make it to see me having been given only 4 or so days to live

Well, no one bothered to tell me I was on my way out and anyone who knows me should know, just tell me I can't ... and I will show you I can.



Thanks to the love and prayers of many people, when I finally "came to" and saw my kids and many other "family" gathered around, it gave me the energy to fight to at least figure out what the heck was going on. Long story short - within 2 days I was moved from ICU to a regular room and discharged 2 days later. Not totally up to par but VERY much alive.

This put me in a vulnerable position. Without much choice or time to get my affairs in order, my kids had me packed up and moving to Texas so they could take care of me. It's a move they have been trying to get me to do for years and probably a smart choice.

Everything seemed to happen so fast, I felt like I was dropping the ball on Bill/everyone and the SPP itself, but I did manage to meet with Bill to give him my updates regarding the SPP.

I'm sure things weren't as easy as all that, but I hope the transition wasn't complete chaos and things were in place to help. I put a lot into my work in organizing, setting up and running the SPP and loved every second of it.

I just want to say thank you from the bottom of my heart for putting your faith in me and giving me the opportunity to run the Safe Parking Program. I'm not sure all of you know how important that project was/is to me and the passion that I ran it with. I think I'm actually going through withdrawals having separated from it so quickly. LOL.

Thank you again for the opportunity to be a part of the WN-SPP family. Keep on doing all the great things you do. I hope our paths cross again.
